Patchwork Pieces

President's Quilt for Eloise: Indian Hatchet

Materials: one 8½" light square, muslin or light tone-on-tone
two 4½" dark or medium squares

Block assembly:

1. Using diagonal seams methods, place 1 dark square on corner of light square, right sides facing and aligning corners. Stitch along diagonal of dark square. Trim 1/4" away from stitching. Repeat on opposite corner of light square.
2. Block should measure 8½". Be sure to sign block.

Read All About It!

Caring for Your Quilts: Textile Conservation, Repair and Storage, By Hallye Bone, Kansas City Star Books, 2008. While museums do not wash or repair quilts, homemakers may choose to do so. There are several suggestions in the book for both cleaning a quilt and making repairs. An owner may choose to vacuum a quilt using panty hose over the nozzle to gently remove dust. Bone explains why some of the old fashioned cleaning methods are harmful to quilt. An extensive list of possible stain removal products is included, along with instructions for washing and drying quilts. This is an informative guide for quilt care, even though the author admits that some of the modern products are unknown how they will affect a quilt in years to come.

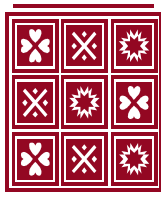
